Our art collection comprises of over 300 artworks, including many that have been specially commissioned. This guide highlights some of the opportunities there are to enjoy artworks around the Hospital.






A Flag for Everyone


Home is an intriguing site-specific installation made from more than 2,200 children's toys and household items cast in resin. The everyday objects cover the walls of the six storey entrance with something new to spot each time you visit, from a rubber duck to a butter dish.

Originally commissioned for the Morgan Stanley Clinical Building, the Nature Trail has now been extended into the Premier Inn Clinical Building to provide continuity and familiarity for families on their journey to surgery. In the Nature Trail's woodland, creatures such as hedgehogs, frogs and birds appear between the trees, creating an enchanting and calming distraction for patients on their way to theatre.

Two innovative virtual windows by filmmakers Accademia bring views of the outside world to the bedside. The remarkably realistic windows offer patients and families views of a living landscape which changes periodically to reveal a series of new outdoor scenes from around the world such as London's Hyde Park and city scenes in Tangier, Morocco.

Binary by Chris Wood uses light and colour to bring dynamism and interest to both the interior and exterior of the building. The design on the staircase windows, using Chris's signature dichroic material, is based on the binary code for the word Future.



Lullaby Factory Studio Weave

The Lullaby Factory is fantasy landscape tucked away between the Morgan Stanley Clinical Building and the Southwood Building. Created by architects Studio Weave it transforms an awkward exterior space into a curious world that engages the imagination. The mysterious network of pipes and trumpets which make up the Lullaby Factory appear to manufacture and release lullabies. There is even a xylophone bench that you can play while you eat your lunch!



Throwing Shapes Joceline Howe

The playroom walls and windows have been transformed with fun colourful shapes by artist Joceline Howe. Joceline's work encourages open-ended play and she has also made a bespoke set of large acrylic shapes as part of the commission that children can use as props to explore colour, form and light.
