A day in the life of...

James, a new GOSH Guide

I was born with complex cyanotic congenital heart disease and was a patient at GOSH between 1980 and about 2001. I underwent several procedures, including open heart surgery to palliate my condition. In 1987 I had a total-cavopulmonary connection (TCPC), an operation pioneered at GOSH which leaves blood flowing passively back to the lungs rather than via the heart. Whilst the complexity of my condition meant corrective surgery was not an option, the fact I had the TCPC enabled me to continue with my 'own' heart, rather than face transplant. This was only possible due to the exceptional work and care of the GOSH team, so the hospital quite literally holds a special place in my heart!

I am a trainee clinical cardiac/ respiratory physiologist, which will involve performing non-invasive and invasive tests, such as echo (heart imaging), lung function or work as part of an interventional heart team in a Cath lab.

Even as a trainee, volunteering at GOSH is very rewarding as I get a chance to make a difference to people's quality of life.

I started volunteering at GOSH in March and like all of you, have started as a GOSH Guide.

I am looking forward to moving into other roles too - specifically one that I can use my experience and skills to help others. I applied for a number of reasons; being at the hospital is an inspiring experience, and keeps me focused on a future in healthcare;



meeting the diverse range of patients, parents and visitors helps with developing self confidence and appreciation of non-clinical aspects; and it also gives me a wonderful opportunity to meet a younger range of patients than I normally would! Personally, it is very rewarding to be able to make everyone feel welcome and see that help is at hand during often stressful times.

Already, being part of the volunteer's team at GOSH is very special; we are all here to help!

Volunteers vital to success in developing GOSH values

February and March have been very busy for our volunteers.
Amongst all the other work they have been doing, they have been vital in gathering views from a wide range of GOSH audiences to help develop a set of values for us. We needed to get input from staff, patients, families, carers and members of the public who have experience of GOSH.

Our volunteers - Helen E, Helen D, Bini, Ann, Carol, Trudie, Jim and Mandy - were so successful in talking to patients and families, encouraging them to complete the surveys that we had received over 1,000 returns from patients and families in the first month. Grainne Morby, Head of PALS and PPI, said:

" Without the help of the volunteer survey group, there is absolutely no way we would have been able to

canvass the views of so many patients and families in such detail. I am so grateful to them – they have done a truly brilliant job"

The completed surveys are being analysed by the research company which is helping us with this work. They will use linguistic analysis software

linguistic analysis software to identify the values and behaviours that

patients and families have identified as most important to them.

The same will be done for returns from members of staff. In May, we

will be able to share the findings with you. We look forward to doing that and, most importantly, implementing them so that we all help make the experience of GOSH the best it can possibly be.

Once again, a huge thank you to our

marvellous GOSH volunteers.

What does 'research' mean to you?

During Research Awareness Week we are celebrating the pioneering research that takes place at GOSH. Come and discover more about our research and what it means to take part in a research study.

Research Awareness week starts on Monday 19th May to coincide with International Clinical Trials day on Tuesday 20th May. A wide range of activities will be held throughout the week for both families and GOSH staff to attend. Presentations and displays in the Lagoon and activities within the Hospital School have been organised; a full time timetable of events will be advertised closer to the time.

Research is a core focus for us at GOSH because we are in a unique position with a broad range of clinical specialties and a tertiary centre for children with complex and rare conditions. Scientists at the UCL Institute of Child Health and clinicians at GOSH work

together to form an integrated and multi-disciplinary approach to the diagnosis, treatment, prevention, and understanding of childhood disease. This allows us to translate research undertaken in laboratories into clinical trials in the hospital which leads to real benefit for children at GOSH, across the UK and worldwide.

Our National Institute for Health Research Biomedical Research Centre award is recognition of our world leading research in to childhood diseases.

In 2008, the Somers Clinical
Research Facility (CRF) opened to
provide specialist day care
accommodation for children and
young people taking part in
clinical research studies.
Generous support for this
development was provided by
Mrs Somers and the JN Somers
Charitable Wills Trust as well as
Friends of Great Ormond Street
Hospital. Children and young
people are also recruited to

research studies and looked after on the wards and in outpatient's clinics. CRF Research nurses work with the medical teams across GOSH to look after the children participating in clinical trials, and their families. The Somers CRF is based in the Frontage building, level 1 and staff at the Somers CRF can be contacted on 020 7762 6892.

All research carried out at GOSH and the UCL Institute of Child Health is managed by the Joint Research and Development office, based in the Institute of Child Health. - * Urology Pre-admissions clinics are held on Squirrel ward, level 5, Variety Club Building (VCB)



How does GOSH work?

Gosh! How does Great Ormond Street get the energy to keep going...?

This is the first in a series of articles about the workings of GOSH that keep the hospital going.

Peter Roche, volunteer, recently visited the new energy centre and was so excited by what he saw and heard he had to tell us:

I was invited by Volunteer Services to take up the invitation issued by Brendan Rouse and Brian Needham of the Estates & Facilities Department to go "back of house" and tour the new Energy Centre in MSCB as part of the Trust's Climate Week activities. As I'm a Chartered Engineer, the opportunity to see where the actual energy for GOSH comes from was one not to be missed!

To fully grasp the sheer volume of the energy need at GOSH we first need to understand the hospital as a whole functioning entity;

101,000sqm of space (about 7 Tesco Extras)14 operating theatres,20 specialised wards,X-ray, scanning and diagnostic machinery,

and then the need to keep re-building and renewing itself.

So how does GOSH get the energy to keep going?

The Morgan Stanley Clinical Building (MSCB) is just 2 years old, and is where the main energy plant for the hospital is located and will be the fulcrum for all new energy needs as the hospital grows. The new Energy Centre occupies the top floor and roof

of the MSCB, and also the lowest of the 3 new basement levels.

So what energy does the hospital need every day of the year?



Water:

Taken from the normal Thames Water facility at street level; it is stored for use in large tanks, with the storage renewed constantly to prevent deterioration of water quality. The water taken directly into the hospital is then specially treated. The hospital consumes around 280 cubic meters per day – equivalent to 600 UK households. What particularly impressed me about the whole facility was just how bright and clean it was, not at all the "boiler room" impression of old.

Electricity:

The amount of electrical power needed daily at GOSH, equivalent to 23 UK household's annual electricity consumption, would mean an enormous utility bill as a normal commercial user. So, a different approach was required for GOSH. The solution was to partly generate its own power. The other challenge especially to a hospital performing so many important operations is that the

supply must be absolutely uninterrupted. This can only be done by uninterrupted power supply batteries constantly charged and ready to kick in if ever a microsecond of power drop is detected. So *if* ever the main power cuts out, the batteries seamlessly take over for up to 3 hours, which is plenty of time for the hospitals generators to pick up the need. These generators, if ever needed, would power the whole hospital for at least 24 hours.



Heating, Ventilating, Air Conditioning:

These three needs in a hospital of this size and complexity are considerable, and must remain constant, healthy and economic. The air taken from the outside has dust and particles removed and is then treated depending on the outside temperature and humidity, cooled or heated, and only then forced around the hospital in large ducts. I was really impressed by the Energy Team's understanding and responsibility in providing the energy GOSH needs to keep going; we are in safe hands.

Neuromuscular Clinic:

The Neuromuscular team in Outpatients provides clinical assessment, diagnostic services and advice on treatment and rehabilitation to children and young people who have life limiting and lifelong conditions affecting their muscles and nerves.

They are looking for additional volunteers to be a friendly and supportive presence for families in the clinic, helping with coordination of the programme of activities their child has to complete during the visit e.g. talk through the plan, check waiting times for Bloods, check waiting times for ECHO and Dexa scans, so families are not waiting for long periods of time.

Phlebotomy clinic: A really exciting role supporting the clinic as a welcoming and helping hand volunteer. Various tasks to support this busy clinic and be part of a team. With this role comes some opportunities to spend time in some radiology, CT and Nuclear Medicine clinics observing procedures as well as some time in urology theatres observing. Ideal for volunteers studying medicine or anyone interested in these areas.

Consent forms changeover: Four lively volunteers are needed to help with the changeover of consent forms on every ward. Are you free on the 6th May for a few hours?

Crocodile Club: Do you love playing games or doing arts and

crafts with kids? Crocodile Club needs a few more fun volunteers to help out on Mondays and Thursdays.

Dietetics: Admin support in a busy clinic. Some involvement with clinic as well.

Follow a Doctor project: Workflow survey, following a junior doctor and observing their practice and updating workflow sheet. This is great opportunity for someone to observe how doctors work over a day. We need lots of volunteers for this project. From the 2nd June for one week.
