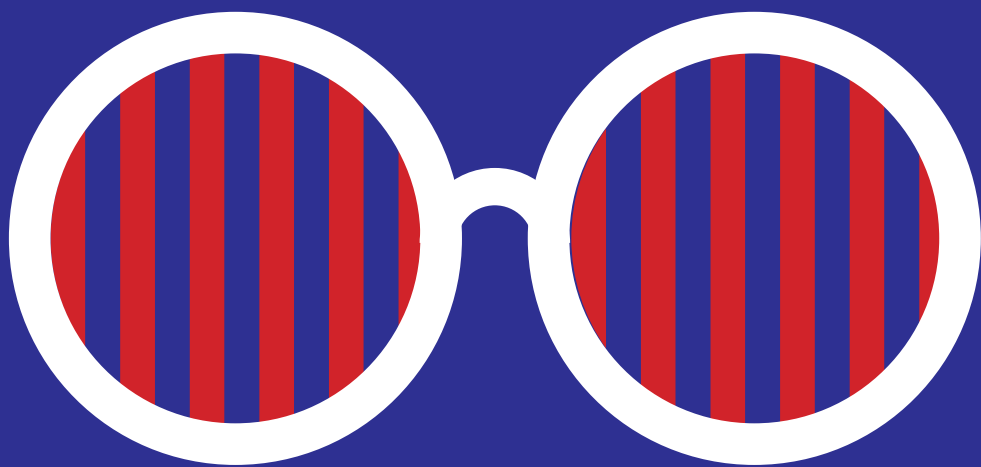

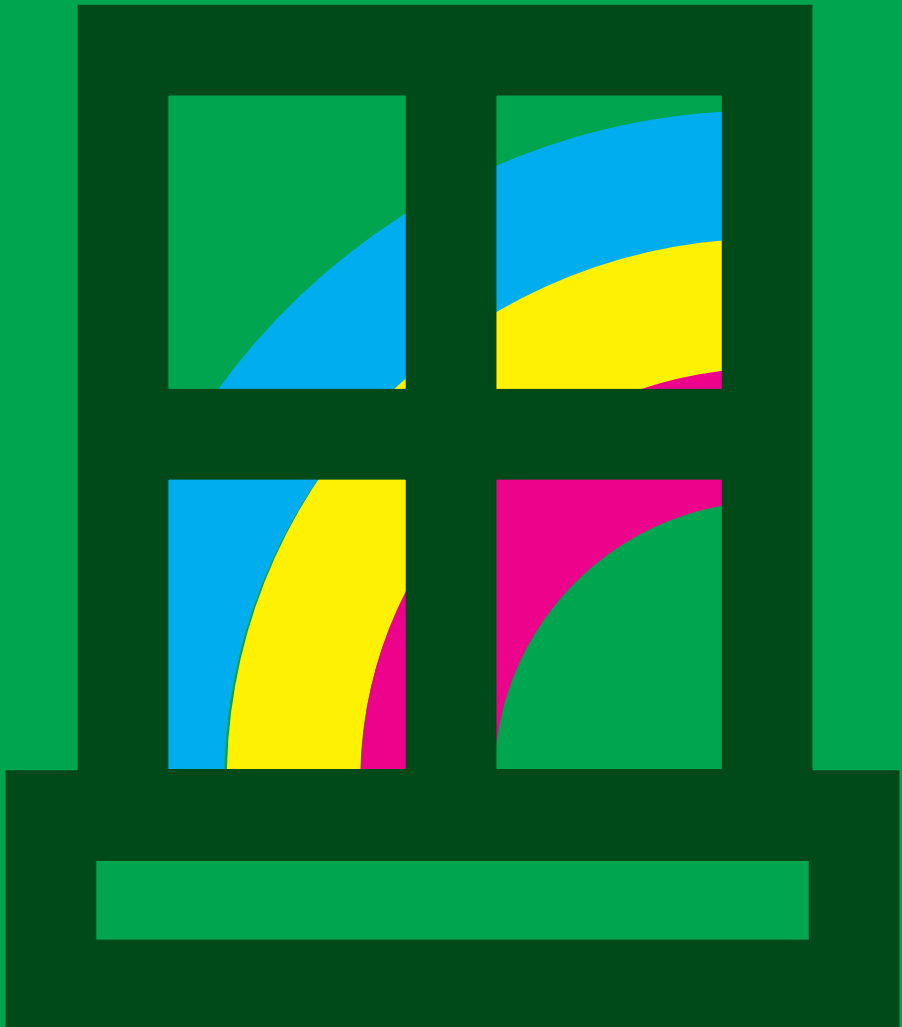

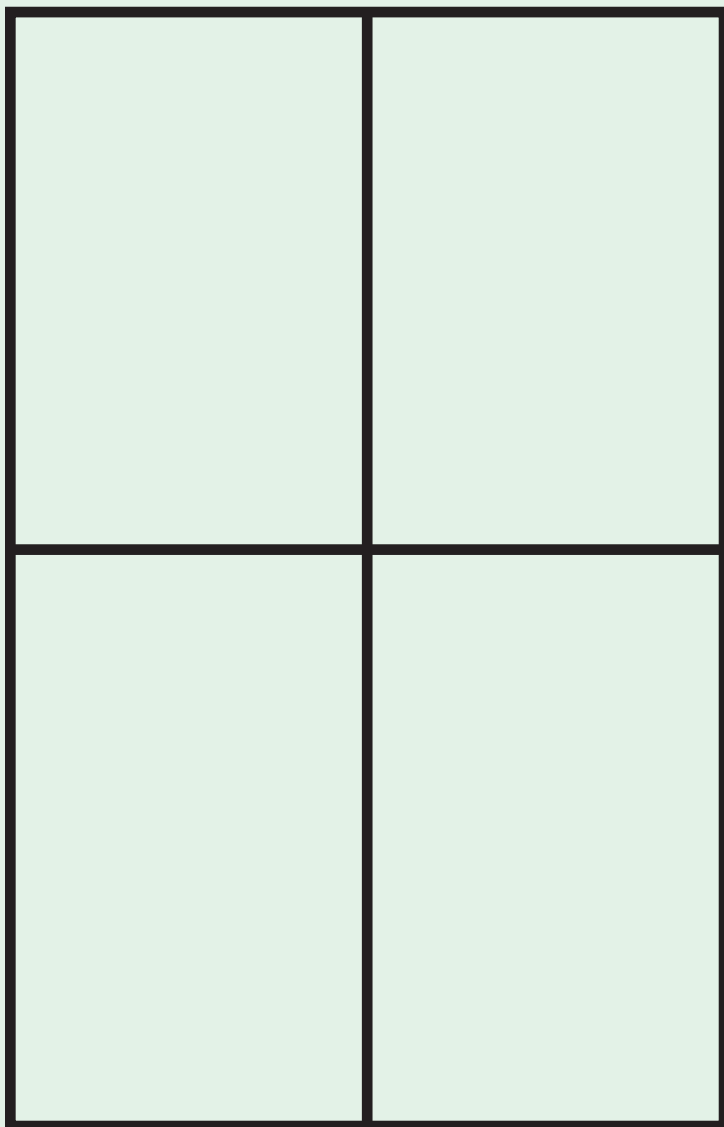

Windows is a film-based artwork that brings views of the outside world into the hospital.

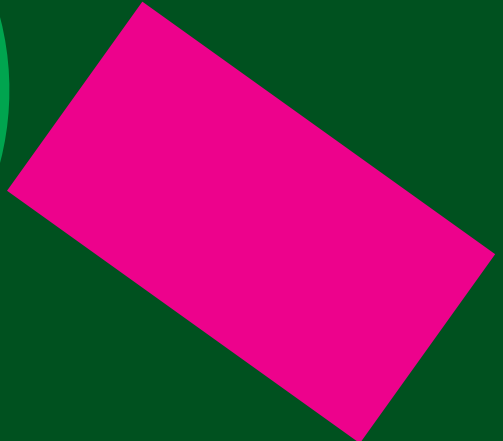
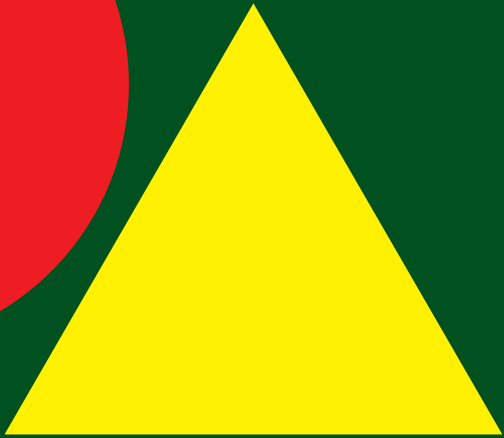
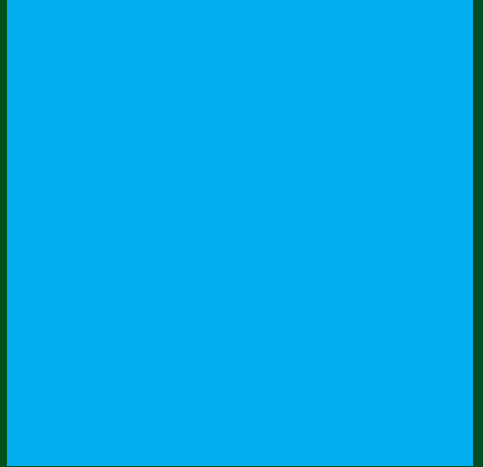
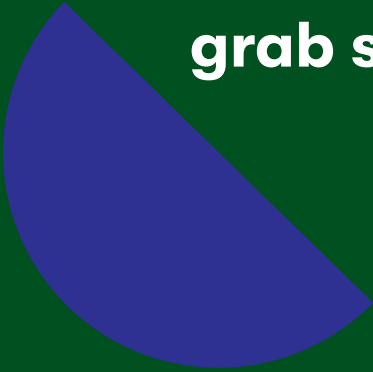
Draw the view from a window in the space below, or draw a view that you would like to see instead.

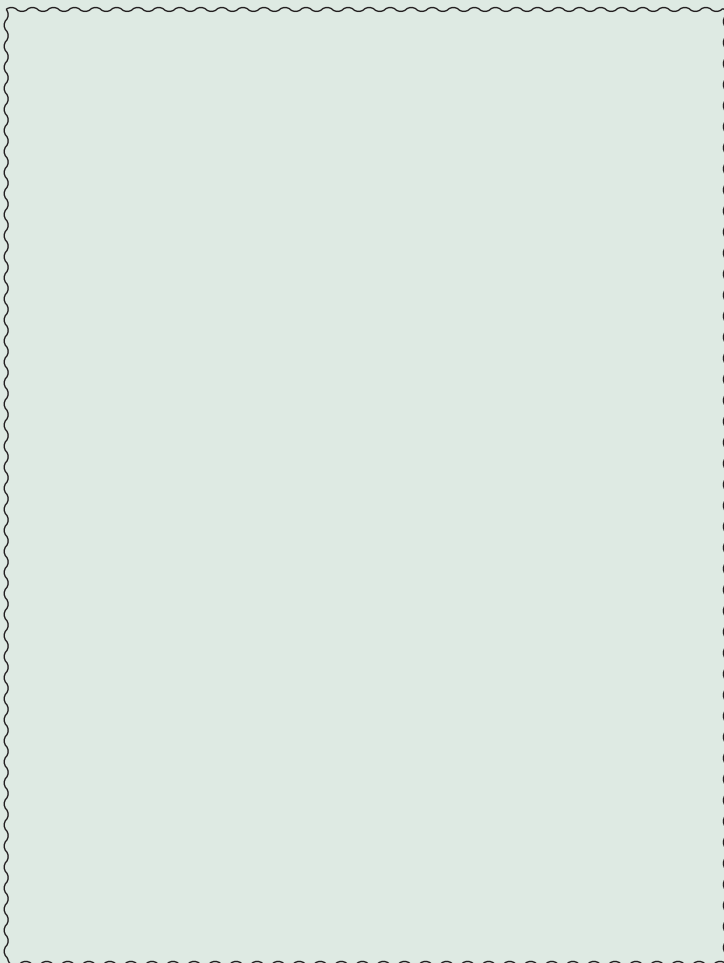
Did you know?

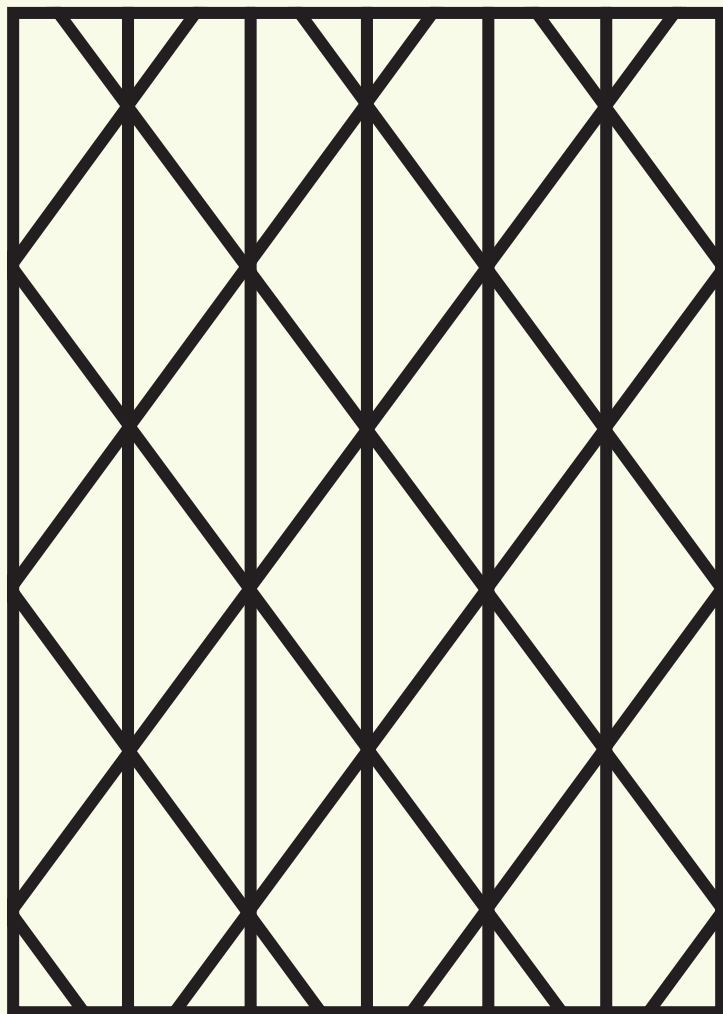

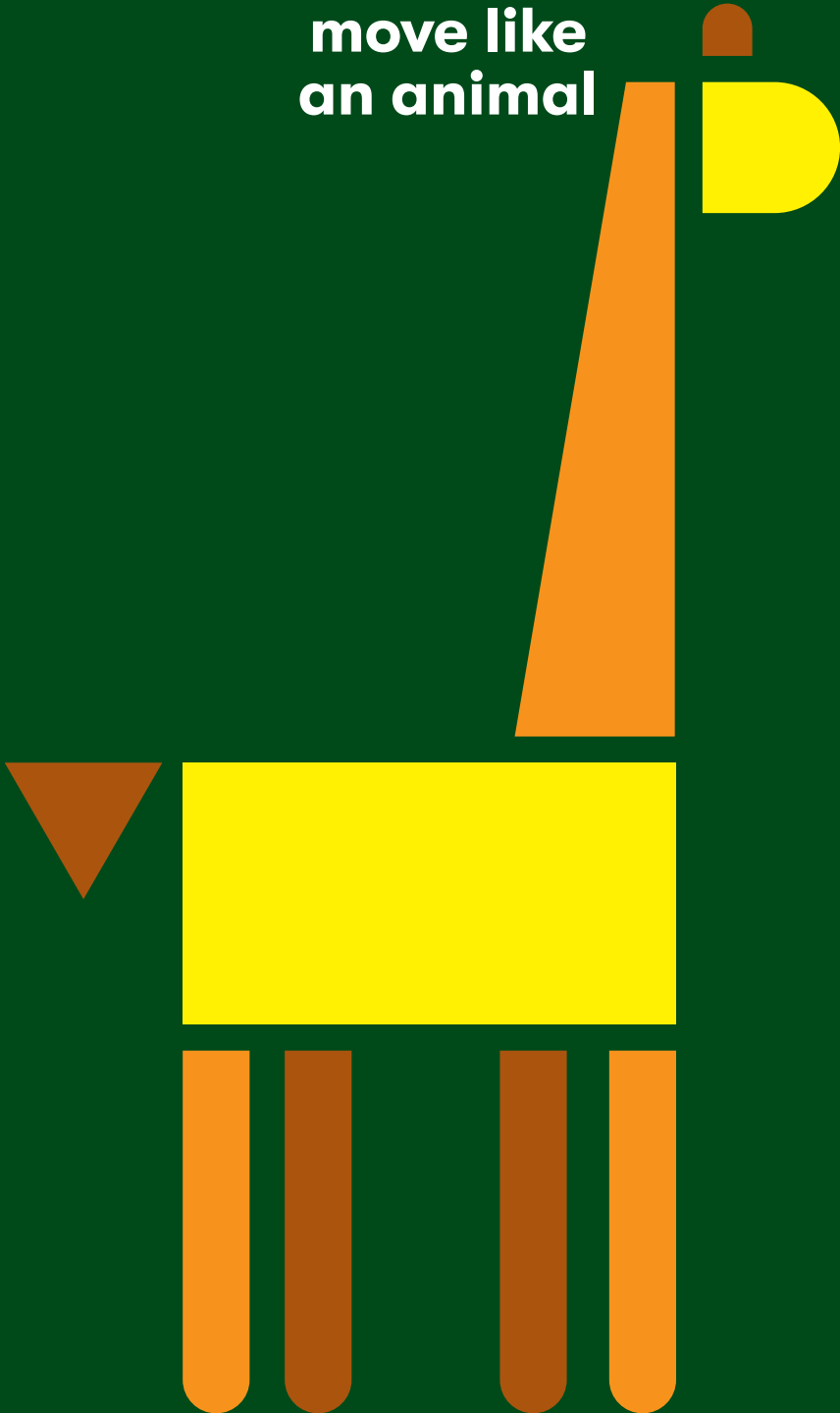
Did you know?

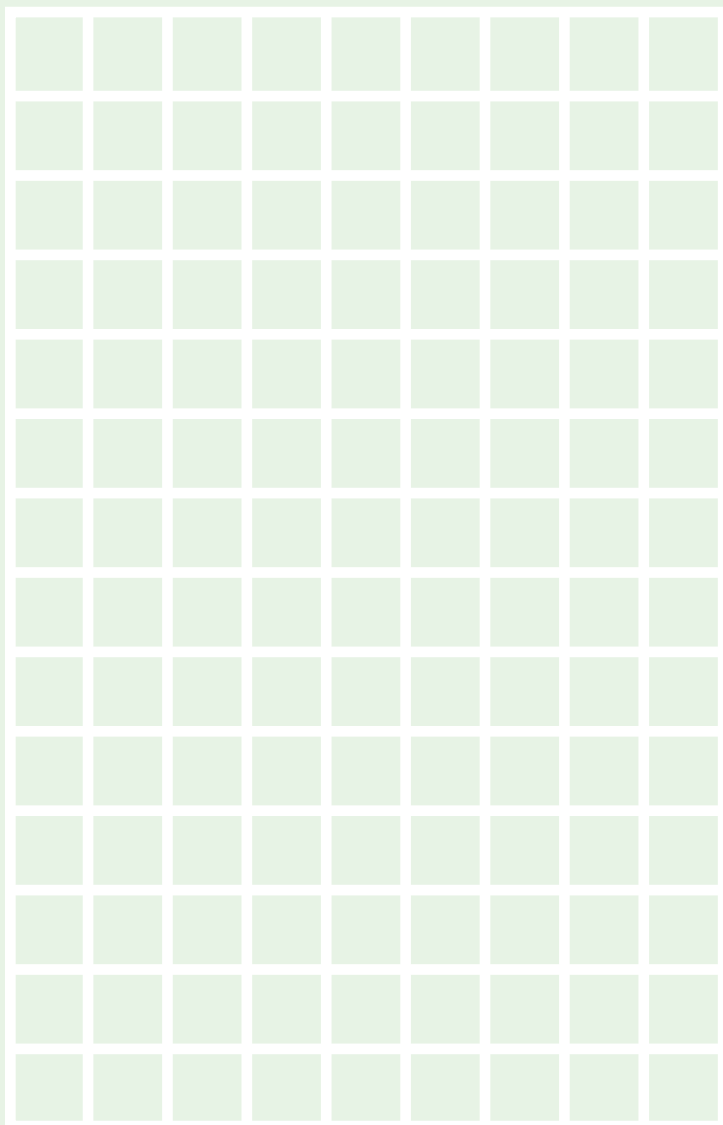
