Thank you for your request for information processed under the Freedom of Information Act 2000. Please see our response to your following request for information:

The Trust is withholding this information under Section 40 of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) 2000.

The Trust is unable to respond to your request for a breakdown of information where a low number of patients of 5 or less (<5) are linked to specific treatments. We are withholding this information in order to reduce the risk of identifying an individual as disclosure would significantly increase the risk of individuals being identified and could potentially be a breach of their rights under the Data Protection Act (DPA) 2018.

The Trust categorises the information about our patients' health as information falling under "sensitive personal data" where disclosing medical information to the public relating to our patients is likely to lead to emotional distress of the patients and their families. It is also the Trust's position that there is a reasonable expectation on the part of the Trust's patients and their families that their sensitive personal data would not be disclosed to FOI applicants.

The Trust has a duty of confidentiality and a breach of this expectation would have the effect of the data being processed unfairly, which is information that forms part of the medical records of an individual that is implicitly confidential. The courts and the Information Commissioner have long recognised the strong public interest inherent within keeping confidential medical information confidential. The Trust holds the view that Section 41 (1) of the FOIA is also applicable for the reasons that: the information was obtained by the Trust, it has the necessary quality of confidence (being neither generally accessible nor trivial) and disclosure of this information to a FOI applicant would give rise to an actionable breach of confidence. Your request is therefore exempt under Section 40(2) and Section 41(1) of the FOIA.

**Please note:**

The United Kingdom Haemophilia Centre Doctors' Organisation (UKHCDO) manages the National Haemophilia Database as they work with Haemophilia Centres in England, Scotland, Northern Ireland and Wales.

The UKHCDO is where information relating to blood disorders is centrally reported on the number of patients and treatments: including statistical data relating to Von Willebrand Disease, Haemophilia A and Haemophilia B.
